LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - WEEK OF JANUARY 9, 2023

113th Legislative Session Begins

The legislature gaveled in Tuesday for the start of the 113th General Assembly. The legislature uses the first two weeks of session as an organizational period. During this time, legislators are sworn in, constitutional officers are elected, legislative leadership is elected, committees are appointed, and both legislative bodies' rules are adopted. Much of the conversation in the halls of Cordell Hull Building revolves around the Governor's Transportation Modernization Act, the legislation dealing with the size of local legislative bodies, and a new public legislative dashboard to increase governmental transparency.

312 bills and resolutions have been filed.

Reduction in Size of Local Legislative Bodies

<u>SB87/HB48</u>, sponsored by Rep. William Lamberth and Sen. Bo Watson, caps the number of members that may be elected to the governing body of a metropolitan or municipal government to 20 members. This legislation is a long-anticipated bill to reduce the size of Metro Nashville Council from 40 members to 20

members. The legislation would allow the city to redraw its districts and determine whether it keeps at-large seats.

HOPE Scholarship Eligibility Extension

<u>SB74/HB27</u>, sponsored by Rep. William Lamberth and Sen. Bo Watson, would allow a student who earns their first baccalaureate degree in less than the projected completion time to continue to receive the Tennessee HOPE Scholarship. These efforts could potentially help meet workforce demands by creating incentives for students to graduate sooner and by upskilling students with additional degrees.

Remedial Education in Four-Year Higher Education Institutions

<u>SB89/HB29</u>, sponsored by Sen. Joey Hensley and Rep. Scott Cepicky, would allow four-year institutions to offer remedial courses to address student remedial needs. Current law prohibits these institutions of higher education from offering such courses.

3rd and 4th Grade Adequate Growth Determinations

HB93, sponsored by Rep. David Hawk, would shift the responsibility of determining adequate growth of 3rd and 4th grade students who previously scored not proficient in English Language Arts from TDOE to local education agencies. 3rd grade reading proficiency has been a much-discussed issue since the passage of legislation in 2021 that created stricter requirements for the promotion of 3rd grade students.
